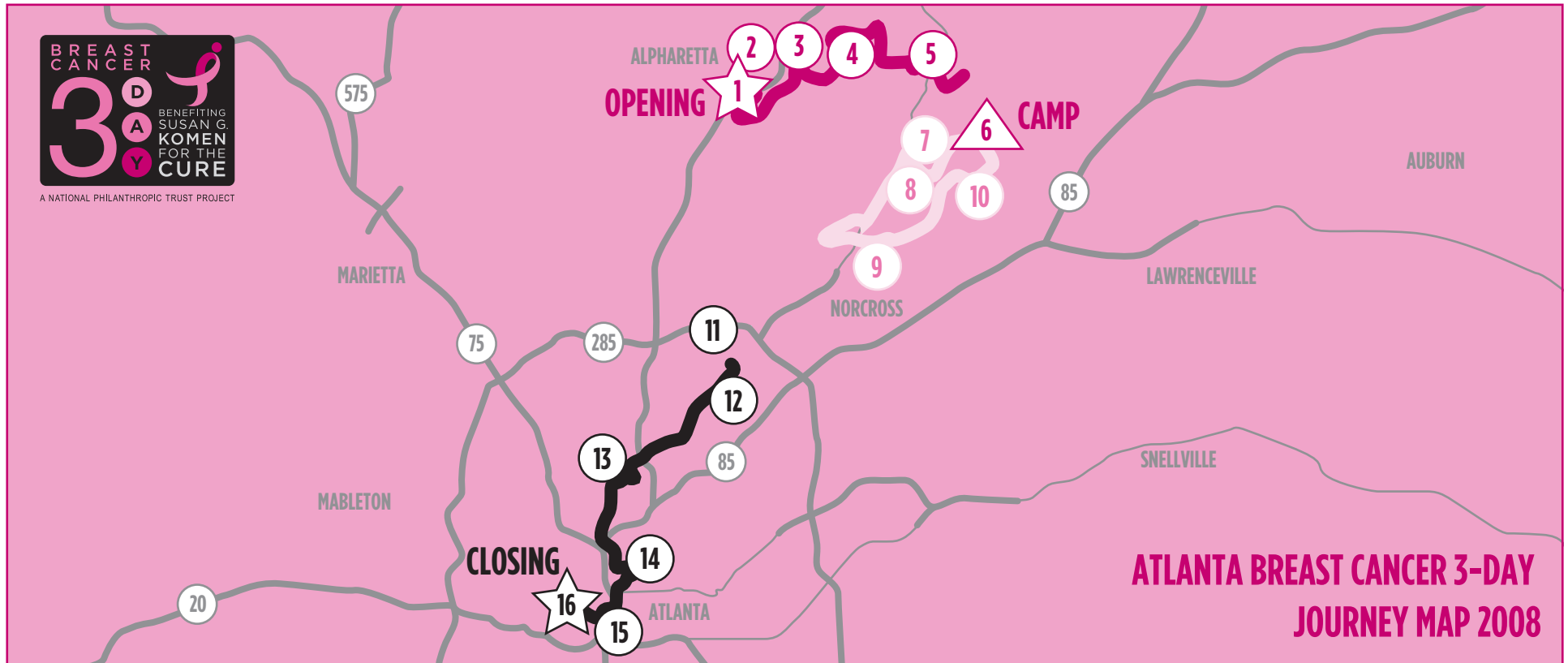

1. Opening Ceremony ★
North Point Mall

2. Alpharetta ▶
Originally named New Prospect Camp Ground in the 1830s, it was settled as a trading post composed of tents, a log school and arbor.

3. GA 400 !
Planning for GA 400 began in 1954, and as we all know, continuous updates are still happening to this day.

4. Lake Windward ▶
Home to over 2,400 families in 20 distinct neighborhoods

today, this entire development was farmland used for growing cotton as recently as the 1960s.

5. City of Johns Creek ▶
Johns Creek officially became a city on December 1, 2006 and includes the formerly unincorporated communities of Newtown, Warsaw, Shakerag, Ocee, Autrey Mill and Johns Creek.

6. Camp ▲

7. Chattahoochee River !
Beginning in northeast Georgia, this river flows 542

miles to its southern end at the Apalachicola Bay in Florida. Anyone up for a canoe trip?

8. Atlanta Athletic Club ▶
Originally chartered in 1898, the club's first home was located in downtown Atlanta, on Edgewood Avenue. The current facilities were started around 1963 with courses designed by legendary course designer Robert Trent Jones, who makes this location his home club.

9. Norcross High School ▶
Opened in 2001 with 2,400 students, this school's precursors date back to the 1820s when Washington Academy was founded in the area for children of wealthy farmers with 103 attendees.

10. City of Duluth ▶
This area, originally named Howell Crossing, became a major part of the railroad industry when Congress granted permission and funding to build a railroad from here to Duluth, MN in 1873.

11. I-285 !
This Atlanta highway, commonly referred to as the Perimeter, is 64 miles around and was opened in 1969 with just two lanes in each direction. Imagine if it were still only two lanes...

12. Dekalb-Peachtree Airport ▶

Georgia's 2nd busiest airport sits on the grounds of the installation known as Camp Gordon, an army training base during WWI, and a WWII Naval Air Station. It's now a general aviation reliever airport catering to many private flights and big businesses of Atlanta.

13. Buckhead !
This section of Atlanta derives its name from a tavern founded here in 1837. After a successful hunt one year, the store's proprietor, Henry Irby, mounted the head of the buck for everyone to see. And the nickname stuck.

14. Piedmont Park ▶
This property was originated as the Gentlemen's Driving Club in 1887. Through a joint venture with the Piedmont Exposition Company they hosted what amounted to the Worlds Fair in 1895.

15. Centennial Olympic Park !
Home to the worlds largest interactive fountain, this park is also the largest downtown park in the country developed within the last 25 years.
